invite GM Fort Wayne employees, retirees, and their immediate families to Family Day on Friday, July 22. There are two timeframes to choose from for tours, 7:30 a.m. to 1:30 p.m. or 3:00 to 7:00 p.m. The last tour will depart 45 minutes before the timeframe ends. Parking will be provided at the UAW Local 2209 Hall, 5820 E 900 N, Roanoke. Shuttle bus transportation will be provided to and from the Plant.

Family Day includes a self-guided tour of General Assembly along with vehicle displays, partner information tables, giveaways, food at the UAW Hall, and more surprises.

All employees and visitors taking the Tour must abide by the following:

- Employees must accompany their family members.
- All visitors must be age 10 or older.
- All employees and visitors must wear flat-soled shoes the entire foot/heel covered and enclosed. (No high-heels, sandals, flip flops, clogs, or Crocs will be permitted.)
- All visitors must watch the Plant Safety Protocol Video prior to entering the tour.
- All employees and visitors must wear safety glasses on the production floor. Safety glasses will be provided.
- All employees and visitors going on the tour must be able to walk unassisted for the duration of tour route (approximately 1.2 miles).
- No wheelchairs, crutches, walkers, canes, or other walking assistance devices are allowed on the production floor. No transportation will be provided inside the plant.
- All employees and visitors must stay on designated tour route, in designated walkways, and follow directions of safety ambassadors.
- No Cameras, video equipment, or other devices with photographic capability (i.e. cell phones, tablets, etc.) are permitted
- No smoking or vaping.
- Please be aware restroom locations are limited on the tour route. Restrooms are available before and after the tour.

 On July 25-28, the UAW Constitutional Convention will take place in Detroit. This will be the first time, in the history of this union, that we will have nominations and the election under a one man one vote foundation.

The desire for this system has been around since I was a Committeeman in 1987. The real question is, will it make a difference and will THIS membership vote to make the difference. Some may believe this will clean up the UAW, and those who have done their jail time for crimes committed will set the standard going forward. I don't believe that will be the case.

As a result of these improprieties, the government has set up an ethics committee as part of the one man one vote process. What does that mean?

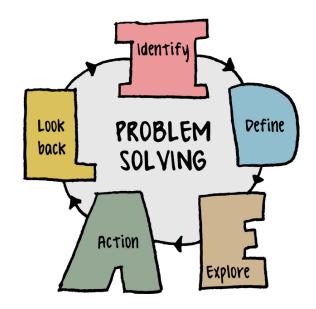

Here is an example. In maintenance at work, we got new uniforms. The new company came in to fit us for them. As you may know, most Tradesmen in our plant are men. So, when I asked for women's options the representative shrugged and said, we aren't offering them. I asked if they carry women's sizing. They do. But GM didn't authorize it. I could have left there and went directly to social media and made a post about sexism in the workplace and how unfair everything is. But I didn't. Because nobody on social media is going to get me the women's uniform clothes I want. I went to see the Shift Leader and voiced my concern. He was surprised at the lack of diversity in clothing and said he would investigate it. My next step was calling my Committeeman and letting him know what the women in trades wanted. He said he would also investigate it. So, the ball is rolling. I followed up a week or so later, and it had been brought to the Assistant Plant Managers attention. Today, I received an email that the women in trades who would like to switch to women's sizing, there would be samples to try on in the front offices, once we tried them on, we just need to email our sizes to the boss and our uniforms will be replaced ASAP. A couple of inquiries, a follow up and voila! A solution! I know its not always that easy, but I know this wouldn't have happened if I had posted how upset I was on social media and that's it.

Social media is great for sharing information, stories, photos and more. But in my opinion, live in person problem solving is the best route to take with issues you have in your life. Get the advice you need, but then take your issues into your own hands and be accountable for them. Take care of business! You'll be happy that you did. Then make a social media post about what you just made happen!

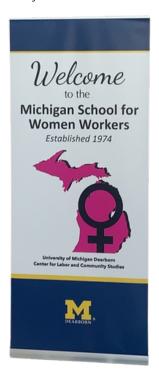
CBTU Convention 2022

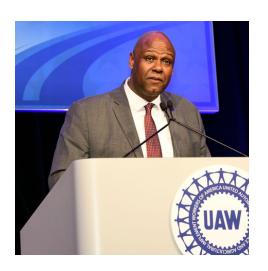


CREATING A PATH FORWARD

Creating a Path Forward, that's what the UAW has always done. Even through the toughest adversity, we always find a way to push forward. Don't get me wrong, we've had our fair share of setbacks, but we always find a way to get back on track. Appropriately, 'Creating a Path Forward' was the theme for the 4-day CAP Conference held in Maryland May 15-18.

The Conference opened with a historical compilation video of our past UAW Presidents. Noticeably missing from that video was 3 disgraced former Presidents who are no longer members of the UAW. UAW International President Ray Curry addressed the nearly 1,000 delegates from across the United States, Puerto Rico, and Canada by acknowledging our past but focusing on our future. President Ray Curry stated emphatically, "Those who don't want to join us going forward, and want to continue to look in the rearview mirror, that scene doesn't get any better. It only changes as you drive a little bit farther. What I will tell you is that vision from the front looks a whole lot better each and every day as we move forward."



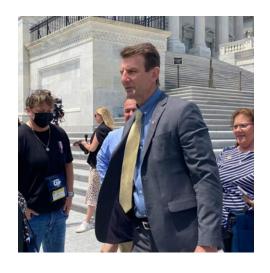
After spending a day hearing from guest speakers on topics that are important to workers, like raising wages, the impact of inflation, the right to organize, the future of electric vehicles, and bringing manufacturing jobs back to the U.S., we had a full day of training to prepare us for lobbying our U.S. Representatives and Senators. The following day, the delegates from 2209 journeyed Local from Maryland to Capitol Hill to share our stories and discuss legislation that would impact the lives of working families. Our members spoke with Representatives Jim Banks, Greg Pence, and Frank Mrvan, as well as Senators Mike Braun and Todd Young.



Even when we don't see eye-to-eye with a legislator, we usually can find common ground on a few topics. Unfortunately when we visited Senator Young (above) and Senator Braun for the "Hoosier Huddle," were both rude they and disrespectful. Senator Young allowed our members to share their stories, but then promptly told us the pro-worker legislation we were speaking on was "garbage."



Senator Braun was less hateful but he had no intention of listening to any of our members or their stories. He spent almost the entirety of the meeting speaking and cut off each member who attempted to share their story. It's unfortunate to see the blatant disrespect from Senators Braun and Young toward their constituents.



However, our members who visited Rep. Frank Mrvan (above) had a great experience, even getting to share some time with him outside on the steps for photos and friendly conversation after their meeting. Rep. Jim Banks only joined our members for a couple minutes in between votes on the floor, but his staff was friendly and gave them a tour of the building before they left. Rep. Greg Pence did not make an appearance but his staff gave our members the time to share their concerns.



All of our members had varying experiences on their lobby visits, but they were all eye-opening in different ways. Even though some visits were not very friendly, it was a great experience for our members and everyone represented our membership admirably.

The final day of the conference had an amazing lineup of speakers. Most notably was Speaker Nancy Pelosi.



She spoke about the UAW's impact on workers' rights throughout history saying, "the Middle Class has a Union Label on it." When Speaker Pelosi finished her remarks, President Ray Curry presented her with the Walter P. Reuther Distinguished Service Award, given to honor those who have made a positive difference in the advancement of human dignity and justice for all. She proudly accepted the award and reflected on our role within the Civil Rights movement, alongside Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. Speaker Pelosi said, "It was an act of bravery then but it was also an indication of the values of the United Auto Workers. So thank you for what you have done beyond the assembly line."

The Conference came to a close with an age-old tradition of joining hands and singing "Solidarity Forever." We have been through a lot in the last 2 years, within our own organization and battling a global pandemic. However, as I looked around the room and watched everyone standing hand-in-hand, I see our path forward –TOGETHER.

2022 LEGISLATIVE FOCUS

Building A Better America Act (BBBA)

- Includes the Kildee Stabenow Electric Vehicle tax credit which would give a \$4,500 incentive to purchase EVs made in the USA by Union workers.
- Lowers prescription drug costs
- Will close tax loopholes for corporations creating a fairer tax system

<u>Protecting the Right to Organize</u> (<u>PRO</u>) <u>Act</u>

- Hold companies accountable for unfair labor practices and give workers the ability to organize without fear -Prohibit companies from punishing workers for exercising their right to strike, by making it illegal for companies to permanently replace striking workers
- Level the playing field by repealing freeloader RTW legislation nationwide

<u>Striking Workers Health Care</u> <u>Protection Act</u>

- Protects workers and their families and would ensure no worker faces the impacts of what GM did to us during the 2019 strike when they stripped our insurance coverage mid-month

SFC Heath Robinson Honoring our PACT Act

- Increase healthcare coverage to Veterans exposed to toxic burn pits by adding to the list of VA-covered conditions and a national registry to track these conditions
- Establish a committee to assist the VA in determining a link between service and illness

What is Angelman Syndrome?

Angelman Syndrome (AS) is a rare neuro-genetic disorder that occurs 1 in 15,000 live births or 500,000 people worldwide. Angelman syndrome shares symptoms and characteristics with other disorders including autism, cyberattack palsy, and Prader-Willi syndrome. Due to the common characteristics, misdiagnosis occurs often. It is believed that there is a high chance of finding a cure for AS, due to the fact that scientists know what causes AS.

\$50 Heart Scan

A heart scan, also known as a coronary calcium scan, is a specialized X-ray test that provides pictures of your heart that can help your doctor detect and measure calciumcontaining plaque in the arteries.

What's included?

Carotid Artery Screening (Plaque)

Ultrasound evaluation of the carotid arteries that screens for buildup of fatty plaque one of the leading causes of strokes.

Abdominal Aortic Aneurysm (AAA)

Ultrasound is used to screen for the existence of an aneurysm (enlargement) in the abdominal aorta that could lead to a ruptured aortic artery.

Peripheral Arterial Disease Screening

Uses ultrasound and blood pressure measurements to check for peripheral arterial disease (plaque build-up) in the lower extremities.

Atrial Fibrillation

A quick and easy test using a 6-lead EKG designed to identify Atrial Fibrillation. Electrodes are placed on the arms and legs. Atrial fibrillation increases the risk of stroke by 5 times.

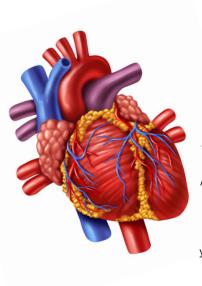
Osteoporosis Risk

An ultrasound measurement of the shin bone to determine abnormal bone mass density.

Speak with your physician about obtaining a HeartSmart CT Scan as part of your annual check-up and wellness. Your doctor can write an order for the scan, help you schedule it, and provide follow-up as necessary. A HeartSmart CT Scan is also available without a physician's referral.

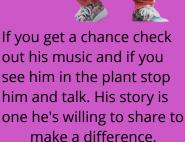
